SOME RECORDS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY OF BARBADOS.

(Continued from Volume XIV, No. 3, p. 115.)

SESSION OF 1770—71

Writs were issued by Governor William Spry and made return- able on 22 February 1770. The Assembly met and again elected Sir John Gay Alleyne as Speaker. There was the usual re-appoint- ment of officers, namely, Rev. John Carter as Chaplain, Samuel Moore as Clerk, Alured Popple Duke as Deputy Clerk, and John Malloney as Marshal. Hon. Hilary Rowe Jr. was the Treasurer and Samson Wood, Storekeeper.

On 13 March Samuel Moore, the Clerk, obtained leave of absence to go abroad, and the Deputy Clerk was appointed to act in his place, in conjunction with his normal duties.

At the meeting held on 3 July 1770 the death of the Marshal John Malloney, was reported. Latimer Richards Duplessy was appointed in his place. On the same day, the Chaplain was granted leave of absence from his duties.

Sir John Gay Alleyne, Bart, the Speaker announced his intention to go to England "to try the waters of Bath", his health being somewhat impaired. At that time, two members, Hon. Benjamin Mellowes and Hon. H. E. Holder, were already absent, and the Speaker could not obtain leave from the House in the usual course ¹. To effect the desired object, the Attorney General, Hon. Henry Beckles, introduced a bill empowering Sir John to leave the island without vacating his seat; and to extend

1. The rule then obtaining as to granting leave to members of the Assembly to go off the island was the subject of a statute passed on 18 July 1721 (Hall's Laws, No. 143 Cl. 30) whereby amongst other things it was enacted that it should be lawful for the General Assembly to give leave to any member thereof, being indisposed, to go off the island, and be absent for anytime not exceeding six months without the election of any person in his room . . . provided that the Assembly might not permit more than two of their members to be absent as aforesaid at one time.

After the affair of Sir John Alleyne's application for leave and the Gov- ernor's subsequent refusal to comply with the bill as related above had subsided, an Act was passed, 24 November 1772, empowering the Assembly to grant leave to any of their members not exceeding four at one and the same time.
